

Developing and Proposing Short-Term Courses

Westfield State University welcomes Short-term course Proposals for the 2019 – 2021 academic years.

The mission of the International Programs office at Westfield State University is to develop academically oriented, quality global initiatives, which allow students, faculty and staff to engage the world, both internationally and domestically, through study abroad and study away, international research, institutional partnerships, and curricular development. The university's short-term courses are an innovative part of that program, and offers Westfield faculty the opportunity to teach in an area of the world that they are passionate about. It also offers Westfield students the opportunity to earn credit in an affordable way while experiencing another country, culture, language, or location outside of the Westfield campus.

As you develop your proposal, consider the unique aspect of the design and delivery of your course: you should consider your logistical needs, such as transportation from the airport to your lodgings, from your lodgings to the sites you will be studying, local lecture space, meals, health facilities, access to internet/wifi, free time, curfews, alcohol, etc. Consider your marketing campaign in light of your target audience, the affordability of your program, and which majors and class levels you will accept. I am available to assist you with your proposal, as are faculty who have been successful in developing and leading a successful short-term course.

To apply to lead a Short-term course:

- 1. *Meet* with your department to discuss department priorities, including scheduling, enrollment, and recruiting;
- 2. *Fill out* the **Short-term Course Proposal form** and obtain the signature of the department chair;
- 3. *Attach* a course syllabus;
- 4. *Meet* with Danielle Emerson, Travel Manager to sketch out a budget, <u>demerson@westfield.ma.edu</u>:

I HAVE SUBMITTED MY PROPOSAL—WHAT'S NEXT?

WHAT IS THE PROCESS?

The International Programs Committee (IPC) reviews the Proposals for the President, and he, or his designee, make the ultimate determination about the course schedule. In making his decision, he weighs the merits of the course, its potential audience, and the diversity of offerings in areas of the world.

The Committee reviews the Proposal, syllabus, and budget for the following:

- Student immersion in culture, such as interaction with local university students;
- Student immersion in place, such as excursions to local United Nations World Heritage Sites:
- The course complements and enhances WSU curriculum;
- Learning outcomes and the location are well-integrated;
- Program and its cost potentially appeal to enough students to be economically viable;
- Safety and security aspects are well considered;
- A detailed marketing strategy to recruit students to the course.

My Proposal is ready, now what?

- 1. Submit your signed Proposal, syllabus, and tentative budget by November 28, 2017.
- 2. The International Programs Committee (IPC) reviews the proposals and makes its recommendations to the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs.
- 3. If your Proposal is approved, you will be notified by the chair of IPC and instructed on next steps: developing your marketing campaign and pre-departure Orientation for participating students.
- 4. Cynthia Siegler will collaborate with you to conduct a site safety evaluation, preparation to market your course and to make logistical and travel arrangements.
- 5. You will receive an Orientation about Faculty Leader responsibilities and emergency preparedness before departure.
- 6. The International Programs Office is available 24-hours a day, seven days a week while you are away.
- 7. You and your students participate in the Welcome back Reception held upon your return.

PROPOSAL DEADLINE: Friday, November 28, 2017

Program proposers are strongly encouraged to submit their proposal as early as possible.
