# STUDENT GOVERNMENT MINUTES April 12, 1994

- I. <u>ROLL CALL</u>: Carlos Santana, Amy Corcoran, Nikki Pugliese, Walter Francis, Heidi Galvin and Kevin Cross were excused. Jeff Sullivan and John Dolan sent alternates. Josh Dutra was absent.
- II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF APRIL 5, 1994: The Minutes were approved.
- III. PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Ted Christ
  - A. Constitution Committee: No Report
  - B. Ted recognized Hal Gibson, Director of the Library, who was responding to a memorandum from SGA regarding the change in the Library hours:

The following dialogue is an adaptation and statements may be paraphrased.

- 1. Dave Kroon How much does it cost to keep the Library open for an extra hour staffed with a work study person? Hal Gibson - It requires a minimum of three people. It would be about \$16.00 per hour now. The cost is only a small consideration. To have a quiet place to study is a legitimate excuse to use the Library. I am trying to find an alternative to this situation by the fall.
- Ted Christ What other options are you looking at to be study areas?
   Hal Gibson A possible part in the Library or I will find another part of this building.
- 3. Karen Guistina Will the Library be open later during finals?

  Hal Gibson We will continue to be open until 2:00 a.m.

  during this time.
- 4. Dan Szenda I don't understand how the costs could be so high to keep the Library open longer. Hal Gibson - There are two Library Student assistants and one Student Security Assistant at that time. Next year there will probably be a regular staff member which would cost more.
- 5. Ted Christ How do you determine the number of people using the Library at certain times?

  Hal Gibson We take head counts before we close. I don't think having it open that long is beneficial.
- C. I have received word that there have been several students reporting alleged incidents of police harassment during the past couple of weekends by members of the Westfield Police Department. I spoke to George Sicaras about this and he will be meeting with Chief Surprise to inquire and discuss the incidents and officers involved. I hope to follow up on this at our next meeting.
- D. Curriculum Committee: Dave Kroon
  - 1. The Curriculum Committee will be forwarding its Core Proposal to the All College Committee for their consideration and approval. It is recommended that the CORE Proposal shall include 2 courses (6 credits) in Composition, 2 courses (6 credits) in Literary and Philosophical Analysis, 2 courses (6 credits) in Fine Arts, 1 course (3 credits) in History/Government, 3 courses (9 credits) in Social Understanding, 3 courses (10-11 credits) in Mathematics/Science (where one

shall be a traditional Mathematics course, one shall be a Lab Science course, and the third may be either of the previous or of an Applied Analytical Reasoning nature), 1 course (2 credits) in Health/Fitness, 1 course (3 credits) in Upper Level Studies, 2 courses (6 credits) in Diversity (where one shall be Global in nature and the other U.S. related), and 1 or 2 courses (3 or 6 credits) in Foreign Languages (where the requirement shall be satisfied by the completion of Foreign Language I and II or the completion of Foreign Language III and IV), resulting in a CORE of 54-58 credits that may be satisfied minimally by the completion of 48-52 credits of actual course work. Also, that any course within the CORE that applies toward a student's major or minor program of study shall be construed as having fulfilled both the major requirement and the CORE requirement and that, except for instances of Diversity courses, no course applied to a student's program of study shall be allowed to fulfill multiple CORE requirements simultaneously. The Curriculum Committee will meet again on April 14 in Parenzo 202. All our welcome:

The following dialogue is an adaptation and statements may be paraphrased.

- a. Dan Szenda How many members of the Committee are from the Movement Science Department? Dave Kroon - Only one, possibly two. I think that it's a Presidential concern.
- b. Erik Whynot What about minors in regards to the upper level requirements?
  Dave Kroon - If you have a course that falls under your minor core too, that will count.
- c. Amy Corcoran I know there was a concern with staffing, especially in Foreign Languages. Have you discussed this concern?

Dave Kroon - Yes, that has been discussed. The attitude was to go around it in a purely educational level.

d. Tricia Rocco - The President does not want a Foreign Language requirement but I understand that he supports a physical fitness requirement. Jen Salmon - The President was looking more at what each department could handle.

Todd Audyatis - I support a language requirement. We live in a global economy.

- e. Jen Salmon I don't think 70 of us can pick apart the Proposal. We either support the Proposal or we don't. I'm on the Committee and I support what has been done. We are a liberal arts school.
- f. Bryan Walsh How many credits total is this?

  Dave Kroon The 120 credits can not change. What will change is the amount of electives you may take.

Todd Audyatis moved that SGA vote on each section of the Core

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Proposal systematically. The motion was accepted with two abstentions (Steve Pratt and Kristen Legor).

J. We are currently reviewing the alcohol and drug sanctions. If you have any concerns, please contact me as soon as possible:

The following dialogue is an adaptation and statements may be paraphrased:

 Ted Christ - I know you discussed increasing the amount of alcohol that can be signed in. Can you elaborate? Steve Dailey - What I asked for at the meeting was basically regarding the issue of consistency to raise the amount of alcohol in a room from 1 1/2 to 2 cases if both roommates are 21 years of age.

K. Regarding our proposed changes to the existing Sign In Policy, the R.D.'s have requested that they have the ability to hold hearings for level 1 sanctions in order to expedite those who violate the policies. In essence, students will be losing their ability to go in front of the Judicial Board. One or two R.D.'s will be trained as Hearing Officers for level 1 sanctions. We need to solidify our position on this policy if we want changes to be implemented in the fall:

The following dialogue is an adaptation and statements may be paraphrased.

- 1. Jon Conlogue The issue of guest sign in has been an issue all year. We're suggesting that we'll go ahead and raise the time which will cause a lot of the Residential Life Staff to be uncomfortable. I also understand that a lot of you may be uncomfortable with giving administrative hearing powers to the R.D.'s, therefore, I guess we have a balance of discomfort. In the long run it can work well for both of us. The vast majority of the students are going to enjoy significant improvements with the number of hours they can have guests signed in. The only people it's going to affect are the people who violate the policy.
- Erik Whynot How does the increase in Sign In from 9:00 -11:00 p.m. relate to giving R.D.'s increased administrative powers?
   Jon Conlogue - What I've been hearing from this group is that

you want increased privileges.

- 3. Erik Whynot How is accountability being increased? Jon Conlogue - There is well established research in Student Affairs that if we deal with things efficiently, things will get done effectively.
- 4. Tricia Rocco It seems to me that Residential Life is playing a game with students by holding this privilege in front of us so they will have more power.

  Jon Conlogue Some of the Residential Life Staff feel uncomfortable about changing the policy.
- 5. Kevin Cross Does that mean R.D.'s would handle Sign In violations, but we would have 11:00 p.m. Sign In seven days a week?

Steve Dailey - The Proposal is 11:00 p.m., seven days a week with the half hour leeway time that is in effect now.

- 6. Kevin Cross What happens when students violate alcohol policies?
  - Jon Conlogue The R.D. would only deal with first offenses of Sanction 1. Students can still go to the Appeals Board. The students will not lose any due process rights.
- 7. Ted Christ Can you clarify the appeals process?

Sue Basque - The Appeals Board hears appeals. The College Appeals Board is made up of the Vice President of Student Life (Steve Dailey), The Vice President of Student Affairs (Peter Mazza) and the Dean of Graduate and Continuing Ed (Wayne Hamilton).

8. Dan Szenda - What is the normal amount of time for the appeals process?

Sue Basque - If the person chooses to appeal, the punishment will not be implemented until after the hearing.

- 9. Lori Potter In the past we have tried new policies and they have failed. If this policy were scrapped, would the R.D.'s still retain their power? Jon Conlogue - I see Residential Life trying this for a year.
- 10. Todd Audyatis Last year the R.D. would propose a sanction and the student could waive their rights. In this case, don't you totally circumvent a jury by peers? Sue Basque - The only hearing process on campus is the Judicial Board. What we would be implementing is two hearing levels, one from the R.D. and one from the Judicial Board level.
- 11. Christina Meriano Why is a year enough time to review this policy but not in the case of Dickinson Hall?

  Jon Conlogue In one case you're talking about making a shift in an already set policy. The other case is something that can be observed at other colleges. It is like apples and oranges.
- 12. Erik Whynot It's my understanding that this was part of the proposal last year. Sue Basque - It was proposed last year in the Committee but it was not brought in front of Senate because none of the students on the committee agreed with it.
- Dave Gallagher I'd like to see something with an increase in Sign In hours without strings attached.

Dave Gallagher moved to reject the proposed Sign In Policy.

- 14. Erik Whynot I still believe that we are being muddled with words and I agree that we should trash this proposal.
- 15. Steve Pratt I believe that any increase of student rights and freedoms is worth supporting.
- 16. Kevin Cross For once they're giving us an 11:00 p.m. Sign In. If people violate this Policy, let them suffer.
- 17. Dave Kroon Are the powers that will be given to the R.D.'s directly tied into the Sign In Policy? If the Sign In Policy fails, would R.D.'s lose their powers.

  Jon Conlogue That's fine. I have no problem with that. The number of cases we're talking about dealing with is small.

  Sue Basque The R.D. will call the student in and ask them to sign the waiver. The student can refuse to sign and go to Judicial Affairs. Under the new Proposal, if a student refuses to sign the waivers, he/she would have the right to appeal. It would go directly to the College Appeals Board.

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18. Christina Meriano - What else would the R.D. be in charge of?

Jon Conlogue - They would deal with all minor sanctions.

Johanna MacAllister moved to Call the Question. The Motion to Call the Question was accepted. The Main Motion stood on the floor that SGA reject the proposed Sign In Policy. The Motion was not accepted with seven abstentions (Johanna MacAllister, Owen Johnson, Todd Dorman, Christina Meriano, Alex Kennedy, Derek Dufresne and Chris Sault). Dan Szenda moved that SGA support the proposed Sign In Policy. The Motion was accepted with seven abstentions (Johanna MacAllister, Owen Johnson, Todd Dorman, Christina Meriano, Alex Kennedy, Derek Dufresne and Chris Sault).

L. Jim Godfrey asked Kathi Bradford to respond to the letter regarding Orientation. Kathi feels that she has a very good, committed staff of 26. She received 24 evaluation forms that were positive. A number of the experienced staff said they had no doubts about the new program and are glad that they stayed.
