STUDENT GOVERNMENT MINUTES February 15, 1994

- I. <u>ROLL CALL</u>: Pauline Kerbici was absent. Amy Corcoran, Christina Meriano, Kristen Legor, Alex Kennedy, Chris Hurley, Melissa Reilly, Corey Bracket, Emily Wilson, Shane Woodson, Erik Whynot, Kim Shea, Josh Dutra and Lori Potter were excused.
- II. <u>APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF FEBRUARY 1, 1994</u>: The Minutes were untabled and approved. <u>APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF FEBRUARY 8, 1994</u>: The Minutes were approved.

III. PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Ted Christ

- A. I met with Brian Cahillane this week to discuss and restructure the Substance Advisory Council. The following changes in committee representation were made and approved by Dr. Applbaum: removal of one administrator (the Director of Public Safety), removed one student representative and changed the status of one student representative to be the Vice President of Student Life (or designee).
- B. I spoke to Dr. Applbaum, Dr. Stakenas, Dr. Lopes and Ms. Salzman regarding academic scheduling. Dr. Lopes mentioned that college cannot require anything of faculty between Christmas and News Years according to their contract although Dr. Stakenas said that's not the case. Dr. Applbaum said that five or six other colleges in the area have commencement the weekend before Memorial Day. Dr. Lopes, Dr. Stakenas and Dr. Applbaum all felt it would be unreasonable to force faculty to have grades in by December 24. Ms. Salzman said she cannot get grades out and be ready any quicker than she is presently doing although she has ideas which she will discuss with Dr. Martin. It is possible to get grades out and be ready if professors had grades in by December 26. I did not do any more than inquire since I did not feel as though I had a unified student opinion. Some of the issues to look at are:
 - 1. Faculty Contract requires 155 days.
 - Faculty Contract requires even hours for both Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Tuesday, Thursday schedules.
 - Holidays are considered when setting the fall and spring semester.
 - 4. Administrative processing over break (grades, bills, transfer admissions, housing, etc.).
 - Students who have jobs through Labor Day and cannot begin classes until after that time.
 - 6. Students taking classes during break at other schools.
 - 7. Senior Week.
 - Processing of grades and determining graduation status before Commencement.
- C. I spoke to Dr. Applbaum regarding the astroturf. He said that there are no actual set fees for the turf and that all rental fees are negotiable. If anyone would like to pursue this further, I can contact Joanne Churchill from Conference Services regarding the turf rental. Dr. Applbaum also said that he was unaware of any situation in which fees for the turf were not charged correctly.
- D. I called Dr. Watson, who is a Faculty member on the Affirmative

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Action Advisory Committee, and she would like to see student opinion on this Committee. The Committee wants to help get information out to students about sexual harrassment, racism, etc. The Committee needs to know what is going on in the classroom and how to get this information out. There are two student positions available and the Affirmative Action Advisory Committee meets every other week and will meet on February 17 at 2:15 p.m. in the Personnel Conference Room.

Bryan Walsh - I don't think so.

Ted Christ - It was passed by ACC.

Dave Kroon - Sue Salzman was concerned that a fee increase would be necessary for printing costs.

 - 1. The Committee discussed the issue of ensuring that the Core have a consistent number of hours for each major.
 - a. Ted Christ When does it look like you'll have closure?

Dave Kroon - The Committee has broken down into political squabble.

- 2. The Committee looked at the foreign language requirement and decided not to keep it as a "stand alone" core requirement.
- 3. The Committee voted down a computer literacy requirement?
 - a. Jim Godfrey Why was the computer literacy requirement shot down?

Dave Kroon - Partly because of the concern with the size of the Core. Also because of the lack of definition of computer literacy.

- The Curriculum Committee will meet on February 17 in Parenzo 202.
- D. Long Range Planning Committee: No Report
- E. Dan Szenda moved to suspend parliamentary procedure. The Motion was accepted.

The following dialogue is an adaptation and statements may be paraphrased.

- Dan Szenda I plan to have a fact sheet on the Captial Plan available for you at the next SGA Meeting. In the meantime, Dr. Applbaum, could you explain why WSC did not get the fairest of shares of funding?
 - Dr. Applbaum This question is based on the assumption that we did not get the fairest of shares. I do not believe this is true, therefore, I can't really answer your question but I will say with 14.7 million, we are the third best funded of the state colleges.
- Dan Szenda But half of that is assumed by the college.
 Dr. Applbaum All colleges will assume fifty percent of everything. All state colleges will match it fifty/fifty.
- 3. Dan Szenda At the meeting on February 11 it was made clear

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that the Presidents of each State College had complete discretion over exactly where the money will go on the campuses.

Dr. Applbaum - That is correct.

- 4. Dan Szenda I understand that the Council of Presidents reluctantly supported this issue because of the funding issue. In the past, you've said that you would come to us if there are any fund increases. Westfield State has the highest deferred maintenance package. There's close to two million in deferred maintenance for Juniper Park. Therefore, students will be paying fees for the Juniper Park School. Dr. Applbaum You are absolutely right. Juniper Park is owned by WSC. It is our building.
- 5. Dan Szenda This is something that we will all have to deal with. The first payment in this fee process will be in 1995. Is that correct? Dr. Applbaum - We will have to make a commitment. When we do, it will be for 30 years. Residential Halls are paid for through bonds. What you pay for your room is essentially a user fee. There's a possibility that in the future, the building authority will oversee this. There is a meeting on March 5 for the budget at the Board of Trustees' Meeting. We know right now that the list was approved and submitted in March of 1993. A lot has changed since then in most colleges. Things such as the experimental theatre in Dever being renovated was not on the list. I don't expect to hear anything final until April. We recognize that for the last decade the State has not taken care of their buildings. Regulations have changed over the last decade that need to be implemented.
- 6. Dan Szenda The issue here is students paying fees for the next thirty years for deferred maintenance.
 Dave Kroon What happens when we need more maintenance? What kind of precedent are we setting?
 Dave Gallagher Aren't there federal funds set aside for maintenance so that the buildings meet ADA regulations?
 Dr. Applbaum No. The Federal Government is not giving you the money. While on the line it says ten million plus items, most are items that will be over ten years. Things that are less than that receive less consideration.
- 7. Ted Christ All the Presidents of the State Colleges unanimously approved this. Did the issue come up of having students pay for maintenance that they never see? They'll probably have additional fees as additional maintenance is needed. The students will constantly be responsible for the maintenance of these colleges while Governor Weld gives fifty million towards snow removal. Is that the precedent we are setting?

Dr. Applbaum - Yes and no. One of the projects on plan is the renovation of this building (Ely) to provide more space for students in the Library. There's also a sprinkler system for this building for 1.25 million. A lot of stuff is not an option. Three elevators on campus for handicapped access. In Parenzo we have to renovate offices because they no longer meet code. If the Governor can find fifty million for snow removal, why can't he find the money for higher education? They are giving 200 million, they are just not giving the other 200 million.

- 8. Andy Johnson Three Universities are getting 300 million each while nine State Colleges are receiving 200 million. You need to get political. You need to conduct rallies and make some noise. The reason students are being hit is because students aren't political. Students need to coordinate their efforts and get political. Students voted to tax themselves last year to build an athletic complex. Students will be paying for that for the next eight years. The only reason you are all upset is because you're being taxed for facilities that you can't see. Installing an elevator is a facility. students are upset by this, they need to get themselves to Boston and voice their opinions. Get Political!!! Dr. Applbaum - This is a separate funding issue totally. It's something that does not have to be approved by the Legislature. The question now becomes, do we go ahead with the projects and worry about where the money will come from or do we not do the projects and worry about the consequences?
- Andy Johnson Understand that no matter what, the work will be done.
 Dave Gallagher - Not only get yourselves involved but get your parents involved as well.
- 10. Amy Corcoran We don't want more fees but these are things that need to be done. They are necessary. I don't want to see this school close down.

 Dan Szenda Realism is all well and good but we need to take political action. This is a fiscal nightmare. After this meeting, you need to get the ball rolling.
- 11. Ted Christ SAC has not come up with a firm position yet. There will be action once SAC forms a position. Dan Szenda - The SGA of WSC can form its own position.
- 12. Tricia Rocco Could we possibly wait until we receive more information. This is a very confusing issue. I think we should suspend forming a position on this until we receive more information.
 - Dan Szenda I just wanted to make you all aware of the situation.
- 13. Amy Corcoran Obviously things are moving quickly. Can we set a timeline on this?
 Dan Szenda I do have a timeline.

Dan Szenda moved to reinstate parliamentary procedure. The Motion was accepted.
