 Patricia Plaster Apple Computer and the Company wi
 - Patricia Plaster Apple Computer and the Company will only sell directly. We do get an educational discount. We also tried to get demo models which is an additional 30 40% off the educational discount but WSC had already exhausted their amount of demo models for the year. There is really only one place to get the 11 X 17 Printer. It is very rare.
- 4. Stephanie Bunter I was just wondering if you had contacted any companies who may be interested in donating equipment?

 Tom Stewart (Point of Information) They are not allowed to solicit as far as donations go. It's all done through the Vice President of Institutional Advancement.
- 5. Denise Gould WSKB does fund raising. Have you done anything to fund raise?

 Patricia Plaster As far as trying other alternatives in fund raising; no, I haven't done anything. I have been very busy and we really haven't had any opportunities to do much else. I really can't think if any fund raising a newspaper can do other than advertising.
- 5. Mike Donahue What was your reasoning for only cutting \$6,000 out of the budget? Ted Christ - I was just trying to be fair. She may have
