 - 1. Sanctions placed on residents of Dickinson Hall have been lifted. Student behavior has been much better. Full sign in privileges have been restored.
 - Summer housing is available in the Apartment Complex for students working on campus or for students who will be taking classes or have an internship.
 - 3. The Sign In Proposal was accepted and the Sign In Policy will change for the fall. It is the intention of Residential Life that this Policy be in effect for the entire academic year

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unless the policy is extremely difficult to implement and control. Changes are as follows:

Proposed Changed In Guest/Sign-In Policy (see Guide to Residential Living, Page 6 Item 4b)

"WSC student guests must be signed in and escorted by their host/hostess from 10:30 p.m. each evening to 6:00 a.m. Sunday through Saturday. Student guests must sign out of building upon exit."

NOTE: The 10:30 p.m. time applies to non-residents of a hall entering after 10:30 p.m. Non-residents of a hall who entered before 10:30 p.m. have until 11:00 p.m. to be signed into the hall by the host.

Proposed Language Regarding Sign-In Violations (to be included in opening paragraph on page 6)

"Students found to be in violation of the guest/sign-in policy will be subject to sanctions including loss of guest privileges and loss of visitation privileges. Repeat violators (more than three offenses) will be subject to stricter sanctions up to an including loss of College housing."

Proposed Language Regarding "Quiet Hours/Noise" Policy (see Guide to Residential Living, Page 8)

"Repeated quiet hours violations indicate that a student is unwilling or unable to respect the needs of other residents. Repeat violators (more than three offenses) will be subject to stricter sanctions up to and including loss of College housing."

- a. Steve Pratt Will this change quiet hours in any way? Steve Dailey - No.
- b. Todd Audyatis What's going on with the other things that were attached to Proposal such as the Judicial Hearing Officers and the specific sanctions? The reason is to lessen the number of people in the building at any one time. Steve Pratt - Point of Information: It was enforced as one person per guest per room.

a. Yvette Edwards - Why was the Ice Hockey Club too expensive for SGA to support? Dave Gallagher - It included insurance, ice time, equipment costs, a coach, referees. There were many contributing factors.

- b. Tom Stewart That's why hockey was cut. It was one of the most expensive sports. Andy Johnson - There are other reasons than Hockey being too expensive. It is also very dangerous. If you accept this club, you accept all the responsibility that goes with it.
- c. Dan Szenda Do you know what the extent of the coverage would be? How far the liability would go? Andy Johnson - They would fall under the policy we currently have. As students, you're responsible to have an insurance policy of some sort. Basically the first \$2,500 is a deduction eaten up by students. After that the insurance goes to \$100,000 which is covered by NACA.
- d. Jen Salmon Right now Vice President Mazza signs the contacts for coaches. Paul Bogan said they could hire a professional coach but that it would cost between \$4,000 - \$5,000. Every other SGA recognized athletic club coach receives \$500.
- e. Ted Christ We really investigated this. It is just not possible for us to carry them. It wasn't a decision that was made quickly.
- f. Kevin Cross Is there any chance in bringing back some of the sports that were cut in 1989? Dr. Applbaum - No one has approached me on this. Right now we are in parody with having equal men and women's sports. If we were to add another male's sport, we would be charged with Title 9.
