
Course Overview:

Intro to Community Planning is a course for all majors that provides the background in planning theories and practical applications to design sustainable, "smart growth" communities. What are the differences between the two cities above? In this class you learn how to protect natural resources, where to place residential and business development, and what techniques work best to create sustainable, healthy cities.

Objectives of the course:

- 1) Analyze how city planning highlights in the U.S. impact our planning today;
- 2) Identify the fundamental community planning theories;
- 3) Understand and apply growth management tools to specific planning and zoning problems;
- 4) Develop an oral presentation of a specific planning issue in your hometown.

Text and Readings: The required text for the course is: *Community Planning: How to Solve Urban and Environmental Problems*, by Stephanie B. Kelly (Rowman and Littlefield Publishers. Available at the Westfield State University Bookstore.



Requirements: The course consists of readings, discussion boxes, two tests and a final exam. Class discussions are an integral part of the intellectual exchange. In addition, each student will be required to research their hometown "Zoning Bylaws/Ordinance," and present an overview of the bylaws and an analysis of a particular planning problem. Project presentations will be designed as podcasts.
