Cultural Geography is an interdisciplinary, systematic, and geographic survey of world culture; enhancing our understanding of the human mosaic that is our global cultural diversity. The three cultural themes include population, social systems, and economies, and we explore the geographic distribution patterns and relationships of and between the three themes. Our objective is to enhance our cultural and geographic literacy, and question our understandings of why culture is where it is; with a focus on characteristics which give unique identity to our diverse cultural landscapes. In application, cultural and geographic intelligence, supported with the latest online information technologies can enhance academic and professional activities and is a prerequisite to participation in the global community.

This semester, I will be researching at the University of the Philippines, Mindanao for a good part of our sessions, and teaching the course from there; including photos, videos, and interviews covering our cultural topics with SE Asia Philippines geography as a real-time exemplar! I am trying to arrange a forum of UPM and WSU students (you) to discuss the issues and gain perspective! Generally this issue will have no effect on our course.

The Announcements page on PLATO, when active, suggests a model time-management framework for compressed courses that works for most students over the years. In brief, there are 3 Theme Assignments. You would do one Theme Assignment every three days. There is a Final (Country) Report, based upon the Themes, which you would draft *while* you do each related Theme Assignment, and finish-up the last two days.. You *must* read and use the textbook chapters; most assignment questions are at the end of each chapter. It is *strongly suggested* you browse and use as appropriate the supporting Reviews and Notes, Videos, and Documents and links. Nearly every student using this *guided-initiative* approach has completed successfully the intercession and summer shorter course venues. All work in this intercession 2015 is due 1/20/15.
