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#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

The main objective is to introduce you to the many tools available to project managers, and to help you understand the modern approaches to subjects like Quality, Communications, Role Definitions, Leadership and other human strengths. This is an extremely intensive course that will require discipline and stringent time management for successful completion.

Topics to be covered fall into three main groups:

- Finishing the Project and Realizing the Results

We will also explore the basics of Microsoft Project.

The term project is building a tool shed for a commercial enterprise. This is a small project, easily understood, but carries sufficient complexity to fully utilize all of the elements of project management. Drawings for the shed will be supplied. You will need to download the free version of Google SketchUp to be able to read the drawings.

There will be three exams, each will test knowledge gained from the textbook, supplemental notes and materials.
