Minutes

Meeting held virtually via Zoom

In accordance with Massachusetts Gov. Charlie Baker's Executive Order Suspending Certain Provisions of the Open Meeting Law, G.L. c. 30A, § 20 dated March 12, 2020.

The meeting was called to order at 8:30 AM by Committee Chair Martinez-Alvarez and a roll call was taken of the committee members participating as listed above. It was announced that the meeting is being livestreamed, and, as a result, will be captured as recorded.

Institutional Advancement Dashboard Progress. Dr. Erica Broman, Vice President for Institutional Advancement, stated it has been the best fundraising year and we are tracking above the last two years, even without the large planned gift. The number of donors has decreased, in part due to the significant personnel turnover in the Advancement office and specifically challenges on the annual fund side. An additional few hundred thousand dollars is expected to be received before the end of the year to help support more students next year.

<u>Westfield State Foundation FY22 Disbursement to the University</u>. Dr. Broman stated that funds received are aligned with student needs. In the coming fiscal year the Foundation will support the institution and students with just over \$1 million, the most ever given, to be focused on scholarships and retention. The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Foundation represents the baseline to be given to the University, with additional gifts received from donors throughout the year. The fundraiser for the dedicated hockey locker room at Amelia Park Ice Arena continues and the Dever Stage campaign will be launched soon. Collaboration with Financial Aid and the Community Foundation has brought emergency aid to those students who need it.

<u>Give A Hoot Results</u>. Give a Hoot raised nearly \$70,000 and had 100% participation from all the boards. There were 327 unique donors, some larger gift amounts, and 50 donors that had not given before. Donations have gone from \$8,800 seven years ago to \$70,000 this year. Goals were made earlier in year with the Westfield State Foundation Board with the anticipation that most, if not all, of the goals will be met.

<u>Scholarship Update</u>. Dr. Broman stated there is never enough money to award to all the students who have a need. A total of nearly 2,000 applications have been received from every county in Massachusetts and as far away as Helsinki, Finland. The largest number are from Criminal Justice and Education majors. Five Paul Dower Live Strong scholarships were offered this year. Advancement continues to collaborate with Enrollment Management and Admissions to identify the best possible students to come to Westfield.

Evening of Discovery-May 7, 2021. Dr. Jennifer Hanselman, Dean of the College of Mathematics and Sciences, expressed excitement to be planning the Evening of Discovery fundraiser to celebrate student excellence. Witness Newton's law of gravity in action to win cash prizes. Funds raised will support undergraduate research and the departments in the College of Mathematics and Sciences. Our Biology program is ranked in the top 25% and Environmental Science is number one in Massachusetts and number four in the United States for quality, access, and affordability.

Spring/Fall Enrollment Update. Jessica Tansey, Director of the College of Graduate and Continuing Education (CGCE), stated that summer enrollments for sessions I and II are up from last year, partly due to the Owl Voucher Program implemented in fall 2020 to give incoming students a free course. There are 35 students currently registered for that program. Some students are taking additional courses to catch up and graduate. Part-time credits for matriculated students are up 31% and non-matriculated student numbers are down a little, which is the same across the state. The cycle for fall is different, with the busiest times in July and August. For now, undergraduate enrollment is great. With a strong summer II, we will start FY22 strong. Virtual events are being maintained to get more prospective students. The dollar amount increases are given back to the University, which comes back and asks for an additional increase to the give-back. We were hitting the extra amounts needed to bring in.

Mr. Daniel Forster, Vice President for Enrollment Management, share the following highlights:

- First-year deposits are up slightly from last year and transfer deposits are dragging a little behind, but up a total of 7%.
- Financial aid packages were sent two weeks earlier this year and offers were increased based on decreased student numbers due to COVID-19.
- Total numbers are weak compared to fall 2019, reflecting a year of complete reliance on digital social media and virtual visits. It is believed the trend will be up to between 1,000-1,100 students the number for the three previous consecutive years before the pandemic year, which was closer to 860 students.

- Last year's yield was 23% overall, with a slightly higher yield for Pell students and those closer to the University. We are now somewhere between 24-27% for a projected yield.
- High school graduates by states was shown, with the northeast trending downward. New York and New Jersey are the next priorities for recruitment, continuing our outreach there. Changes in student demographics from 2019-2036 reflect where recruitment needs to focus.
- An employment market survey was shared, together with a competitor and outcome analysis. Our marketing always pushes affordability and outcomes.
- A cross-search of competing colleges and top feeder high schools was done, showing some of our biggest competitors. Increased and more strategic travel to an additional 100 high schools has happened in the last few years.
- Out-of-state recruitment is up 2-3%, partially due to the new scholarship created, but also marketing the proximity and programs. We are traveling further distances to visit students.
- The Athletics, Honors, Banacos, Urban Ed, and International Student programs were discussed.
- We will be converting to the Common App this summer, which will be huge in generating more applications.

<u>HERF II Student funding</u>. Michael Mazeika, Director of Financial Aid, shared information on the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund II. Sixty percent of funding went to Pell grant students and 3,778 students received a block grant. Two separate options for additional disbursements to students for fall 2021 were also presented.

<u>Web Update</u>. There was an investment from the University in the last year to update the website, which was crashing every 30-60 seconds. Alyssa Goodreau, Director of Marketing, stated that research, discovery, and focus groups were done July through November. We were able to identify the challenges, aspirations, and focus areas and expanded the academic major content, improved the conversion paths, and better communicate the campus experience with the student. We are also able to effectively express diversity and inclusion. All of this data sets the stage to be able to gauge our success metrics. The new website is hoped to be launch in the summer of 2021.



ADMISSION FUNNEL REPORT — FIRST-YEARS 6/22/2021




ADMISSION FUNNEL REPORT — TRANSFERS 6/22/2021

On April 27th, the Financial Aid Office sent out revised award letters to accepted First-Year Students who had not paid their Admission Deposit to join the incoming Fall 2021 class.

Breakdown

The Housing Scholarship has been offered to 667 students as on June 22nd

- Initially, 619 students were awarded the scholarship
- Subsequently, 48 additional students have been awarded since April 27th

Of the 667 students:

- 305 students have declined their offer of Admission
- 4 students have switched their plans from living on-campus to commuting
- 71 students have paid their deposit (see breakdown below)

Notes

- Average award was \$2,521. Most of the offers accepted (63%) were by students who were Pell Grant eligible, a population that would be most impacted by the pandemic.
- The offer of the Housing Scholarship took place too late in the cycle to have any impact on the class. Had this offer been made closer to the beginning of April, the yield would have been much greater.
- The deposit rate is considerably lower than expected. Based on the trend from the class, we were expecting at least 150 students would have deposited.
- The use of reserves to cover the Housing Scholarship will not be needed for the Fall 2021 semester.




