Course Description

This course is a college-level introduction to American national government and politics. But this is not a glorified version of your high school civics course. Yes, we will use a textbook, but there the similarity ends. The authors and publisher of our text have made it very easy for us to examine not only the history and operation of American political institutions and processes but also to comprehend elements of continuity and change in the American political system and the social, cultural, and economic contexts in which these institutions have functioned and are functioning, as well as the nature and scope of the policies generated by those institutions and processes.

Our PLATO course website contains the syllabus, instructor announcements, exam question study lists, some of the instructor's lecture notes from his daytime course, and additional readings. Students are expected to consult PLATO several times each week for updated information and announcements. The readings on PLATO will keep you up to date on important themes in the course and are considered part of the essential readings for the course. You will also find the assigned Videos on PLATO (as well as transcripts for some).

Course Requirements and Grades

1. Six (6) weekly tests on material for each week. Each test counts 10% of course grade. 60% of course grade

2. Evaluation of two (2) videos on PLATO. Choice of subjects TBA. 10% each. 20% of course grade

3. Short paper (4-5 pages): Why is American government so dysfunctional? 20% of course grade

Each test will be posted on the PLATO Course Website no later than Noon each Monday and will be due no later than Noon the following Monday. Test questions should serve as your study guide and road map through the assigned readings, videos, and instructor's lecture notes for each week.
