Here's some information about the course to help you decide.

Course description:

This course will focus on the diverse field of Cognitive Psychology. Cognition including how we learn, remember and forget and how our expectations and the context of events affect our comprehension, interpretation and memory of those events. The study of cognition also includes the study of creativity, problem solving, decision making, language and communication. This course will cover both theory and empirical research findings, and will include applications of theory and research to such fields as education, business and law.

Course Objectives:

- ✓ To learn about the broad field of Cognitive Psychology and its content areas, history and origins.
- ✓ To appreciate the role of cognitive psychology in every day life
- ✓ To integrate course content with personal experience
- ✓ To develop the skills necessary to continue life long learning

Required text:

Goldstein, E. B. (2011). <u>Cognitive Psychology: Connecting Mind, Research, and Everyday Experience</u> (3rd). Cengage Learning and either **CogLab2 Online Manual** with **CD or** access code

Students have the option of buying or RENTING the needed materials directly from the publisher (at <u>www.cengage.com/highered</u>, or buying them from the WSC Bookstore or other online site. If you buy a used book, make sure it is the 3rd edition.

You should also be able to find used copies of the book online at various sites or perhaps even in the University bookstore. Be aware that our bookstore will have limited copies of the text. Look around as prices vary.

Course Format and Instructor Availability:

This is an asynchronous class, meaning that both students and the instructor will sign in to the course pages on their own schedules and work independently of each other, but there are certain minimum requirements to insure that this course is a good choice for you.

1. Have stable internet access, intermediate-level computer skills, and familiarity with the PLATO course environment. Inability to access the site, navigate the pages, or open files will not excuse you for missed or late assignments.

2. Complete all the assigned readings, assignments and quizzes.

3. Have basic skills in Microsoft Word (or a similar word processor)

4. Check in to the course several times per unit and post responses to the discussion topics for the week. Students who complete all of their postings on the same day, or who do not post until the end of the unit, will receive lower grades.

5. Start each unit's assignments towards the beginning of the unit, so as to work out any problems (technological or otherwise) as early as possible.

6. Contact the instructor if they have any difficulties.

I will generally check the course page every day, usually in the morning, and respond to e-mail at that time. You can almost always expect a response to e-mail within 48 hours. The content of the course will be presented online in weekly modules. Each module will generally correspond to the chapter(s) in the text. Along with reading assignments from the text, each module may include supplementary reading, weekly projects, chapter quizzes and discussion questions.

An introduction to the Cognitive Psychology Cognitive Neuroscience Perception Is there more than one type of memory? Short-Term and Working Memory Long-Term Memory—Structure Long-Term Memory—Encoding and Retrieval How can we improve our memories?
