POLS 101 AMERICAN NATIONAL GOVERNMENT

This is an on-line version of American National Government, a college-level introductory course to American politics. This course is part of the Common Core of Studies at Westfield State University and counts three credits in U.S. History & Government [HSGV] of the Social Science Section. By taking this class, Westfield State students earn 3 of the 12 required credits in the Common Core Social Science Section. For non-Westfield State students, this course can be easily transferred to other colleges and universities and count toward general education credits.

This course focuses on major contemporary issues in American national politics. After briefly examining the founding of the United States and key institutions in the federal government, we discuss major controversies in the nation. We examine America's failing healthcare system that has badly prepared the nation for the COVID 19 outbreak; we also explore ways to contain soaring healthcare costs. We look into the US government's budget deficits and rising federal debt. We cover the electoral college system and the upcoming presidential election in November. We talk about Social Security, Medicare, and other popular government programs. And we also discuss the pros and cons of free trade and the United States' economic policy.

A. Course Requirements

Students are required to participate in six group discussions online (one discussion per week). Students will be working on five questions each week, totaling 30 questions over the six-week period. Group discussions will be the only means for the instructor to assess students' learning and the only venue for students to demonstrate their progress in learning in this course.

B. Course Materials
