**Course Description:** In this course you will learn about how humans process information about their social environments and situations by examining relevant perspectives on learning, such as the cognitive perspective, social learning perspective, and the socio-cultural perspective; the latter emphasizing how our social thoughts and behaviors are encompassed within the larger context of societies we live in. The goals of this class are to examine human social behavior from the viewpoint of the person: traits, motivations, and moods; the situation: threats, cultural norms, pressures, and influences; and the interaction of the person-situation.

In addition to the main text for the course, we will also use scholarly articles, which appear in professional journals and provide the backbone of social psychological research in the field, and "popular" articles, which appear in other nonprofessional sources such as magazines and newspapers, geared toward the general public. These articles will provide the basis for fueling online discussion.

#### **Required Texts:**

Branscombe, N. R. & Baron, R. A. (2017). *Social Psychology 14<sup>th</sup> edition*. Boston: Pearson. (With online access to Pearson's *Revel* which gives an Access Code Card. The text comes bundled with this at the WSU bookstore, otherwise you'd need to purchase it separately from the Pearson website pearsonhighered.com) I am also fine with you purchasing the 13<sup>th</sup> edition (one just prior to the current one).

#### **Performance Evaluation Overview:**

You will be evaluated in this course on the basis of the following 2 elements:

1. Exams: there will be an exam each Unit covering 2 chapters per unit for a total of 6 exams over the course. Once you click into the exam you MUST complete it in ONE SITTING. YOU HAVE 45 MINUTES TO COMPLETE AN EXAM ONCE YOU CLICK INTO IT. If you are bumped out of the system for any reason while taking a exam you'll be able to log back in and resume your exam where you left off but the timer continues. When your time limit of 45 min is reached the exam will automatically close at whatever point you're at. Always double check to make sure your exams are submitted

- correctly. Anything submitted after the due date will be marked late. <u>Your lowest exam</u> <u>score will be dropped</u>. **Please note: Summer and Winter session courses move VERY** fast! For winter session your first exam is the third day of the class!!
- 2. <u>Discussion Board</u>: Your participation in this course is vital to the lively discussions that can ensue just from the challenging and poignant topics we will be covering! In this manner I gauge your participation in the course through your weekly responses to questions I pose on the course discussion board, as well as your responses/comments on other students' posts. Discussion postings are my way of also gauging your writing, so careful attention should be given to your responses (grammar, sentence structure, content, etc.) You may be asked to respond to a question I pose regarding one of the additional readings you are assigned or a video that you are asked to watch.
  - a. Winter session courses will have a discussion posting and responses every other day.

### **Grading Breakdown:**

Exams = 6 exams x 30pts each = 180 pts (minus lowest exam dropped) =150 pts possible (50% of grade)

\*Each exam will have 30 questions worth 1pt each and your lowest exam score will be dropped

**Discussion Board** = 6 units of discussion board postings and responses to others' postings x 25pts/ea week = 150 pts possible (50% of grade)
